PASTOR'S NOTE

Greetings,

Lent is over and Easter is here. Easter worship traditionally begins with the following phrases: Christ is Risen! Christ is Risen Indeed! We exchange that Easter greeting with enthusiasm and feeling. But what do those words really mean? Do we mean them when we say them? Yes! But, what about when Easter worship has concluded? What impact do they have on our lives?

Who is this God the world is so busy accepting and rejecting? As a pastor, I find that we, as human beings, are very creative—and one of the things we delight in constructing is God. We first "create" a view of God, then find that being worth either of acceptance or rejection.

If we "accept" the god we have created, we often feel compelled to criticize or condemn those who see God differently. If we "reject" God, it is usually a god of our own making we find wanting. We first create a monster and then shut it out of our lives. A third response, of course, is simply to declare God "irrelevant" to our fast-paced, modern lives. We can then sweep our spiritual lives into a dusty corner, to be rooted out when needed, if needed.

God is not surprised. Since creation (the time when God created us), God has sought to tell us who God is. The effort has not been easy or by and large very successful. We are a

strong-headed species and we like to decide for ourselves. Jesus, however, was sent by God to show us what we need to know.

During Lent, 2018, we have reflected on what Jesus has told us using the "I AM" statements from the Gospel of John. Easter invites us to reflect on them once again. Will we trust what Jesus has said? Or will we cling to the illusions in our own imaginations?

- Which of Jesus' affirmations will we believe?
- Which will we "reject"?
- Which will we find to be "unnecessary" to our lives?

As we live into the reality of Easter, it is possible to be reinvigorated in our lives of faith. It is possible to deepen our relationship with the God who has declared, "I AM", "I exist." Who will we be in response to the God we meet in Jesus Christ?

Blessings on this day and in the Eastertide to come.

Meet a Maine Author - Kay Hardy Campbell Presents Saudi Women: Change and Challenge

Jefferson author Kay Hardy Campbell will discuss "Saudi Women: Change and Challenge" on Wed Apr. 18, 6:30PM. The talk will offer perspectives on current changes facing Saudi women, including the recent government ruling that will officially permit woman to drive starting this June.

Campbell is an Arabic speaking writer who has worked as a freelance journalist in Saudi Arabia from 1978 to 1985. Her blog on Saudi women driving has been following the subject since 2009. She is a graduate of Univ. Minnesota, and earned graduate degrees from Harvard and Northeastern Universities.

A Caravan of Brides is a historical novel set in the world of Saudi women. This multi-generational story steps back and traces the early history of Saudi Arabia, starting in WWI, all through the eyes of women. Copies of the book will be available for purchase. Kirkus Reviews gave it a starred review noting it is "a mesmerizing Middle Eastern tale from beginning to end."

SUSTAIN WAYNE'S HISTORIC HALL RENOVATION PROIECT UPDATE

Recent efforts by Dirigo Architectural Engineering confirmed what the Sustain Wayne building committee had previously determined: the Hall is in relatively good shape given its age and recent neglect. However, the study did convey an unexpected urgency in replacing the sill on the General Store side of the building, and well as some of the footings under the building. Years of fighting snowmelt and erosion have resulted in significant rot.

The first phase of our renovation plan is to jack the building several feet, bringing it out of the flood plain, replace the sill and any rotten beams and footings, and construct a new foundation. Because of the increased pressure on the building's long-term structural viability, the rotting sill adds urgency to the restoration effort. We hope to raise the funds needed by Early Summer 2018 to begin the necessary work. The estimate for the jacking, foundation and sill work is approximately \$80,000, and we have currently raised \$25,000 towards this phase of the project.

We thank everyone who has supported our efforts to renovate the historic Hall, and respectfully ask you to consider supporting this Phase I of renovation/restoration. Sustain Wayne is a 501c3 so your donation is tax deductible to the fullest extent allowed by law. Shoring up the building with a new foundation will ensure its presence on the edge of the pond for future generations, standing tall as a familiar and welcoming beacon of our historic village.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR THIS MUD SEASON

As the temperature begins to rise, we welcome Maine's fifth season - Mud Season! With snowmelt and mud comes erosion and runoff - some of the biggest threats to water quality. The particles and pollutants carried by runoff into our water can decrease the overall environmental and recreational value of a lake. Even naturally occurring elements such as phosphorus can become detrimental in large quantities, causing algal blooms, harming fish, and decimating water quality. Spring is a great time to notice if erosion and runoff are problems on your property. Do you have exposed roots and rocks, loss of soil, or undercutting on your shoreline? Perhaps you see a lack of natural vegetation, spots of bare soil in your yard or a pathway or driveway that goes downhill towards the water? If you said yes to any of these things, we may be able to help you restore your lakefront property and help with the overall water quality of your lake!

Our Youth Conservation Corps (YCC) provides erosion control landscaping for lakefront property owners. Projects may include: shoreline plantings, rain gardens, infiltration dripline trenches, open-top culverts and more. All projects are designed in partnership between the landowner and experienced technical program staff.
