PASTOR'S NOTE

Greetings,

During Lent, we will be exploring the Gospel of John as part of our Sunday morning worship. John speaks about Jesus using sentences beginning, "I am..."

Week 1—"I am the Bread of Life"

Week 2—"I am the Light of the World"

Week 3—"I am the Door"

Week 4—"I am the Vine"

Week 5—"I am the Way, the Truth and the Life"

Week 6—"Who do you say that I am?" (Palm Sunday)

Week 7—"I am the Resurrection and the Life" (Easter)



Throughout Lent, we will look at each of those and how those statements impact our lives and our understanding of who God is. As we prayerfully enter Lent, may our hearts be open and ready for the journey. The Lenten season is a time of repentance and drawing nearer to God. Some people intentionally give up things and others add things in to their routine in an attempt to be closer to the Divine. Lenten rituals help us to take an honest look at ourselves and create an opportunity where we can intimately experience the fullness and richness of God.

A couple years ago, I read somewhere that Lent is like entering the darkness without a flashlight. However, I disagree. While Lent is a season where we empathize with Christ's suffering, we do not walk the path alone. The "flashlight" that we carry is Christ himself. As we prepare for, and embark on, our Lenten journey, may we do so with an open heart and an open mind, but most of all, with a willing spirit. After all, we do not travel alone and are continually held by grace and love.

1923 - 2018 WINTHROP

William "Bill" Page Maxim, 94, passed away peacefully on Saturday, Jan. 13, 2018, at Marshwood Center, Lewiston, after a brief illness.

William was born on May 31, 1923, in Winthrop, the son of Nelson and Abbigail (Allen) Maxim. He attended school in Winthrop and after high school went to the National Youth Associates Boatbuilding School in Biddeford. In 1943, he went to work at the Bath Iron Works facility in South Portland. Bill was drafted into the service, joining the Air Force as a flight engineer as one of the first 19-year-old group of draftees. He was discharged in February of 1946.

He met Norma Dudley shortly after being discharged from the service. They were married on June 29, 1946. They raised three children, Kenneth, Everett and Faye.

Bill owned an interior and exterior painting business for over 40 years. He also served as rural carrier for 19 years before retiring in 1987. That same year, he was recognized as the Outstanding Rural Carrier of Maine. Bill was a member of the Winthrop Congregational Church, a member of the Winthrop Grange for over 50 years and a member and past president of the Hillandalers Snowmobile Club, one of Bill's passions. He also belonged to the Alfred Maxwell Jr. American Legion Post 40 and the V.F.W. He was a Past Grand and District Deputy of the Crystal Lodge IOOF of Winthrop.

Bill also enjoyed spending time outdoors, hunting and snowmobiling being some of his favorite activities as well as spending time at the family camp on Androscoggin Lake. He could also be found taking in the horse and ox-pulling at many of the state agricultural fairs.

In June of 2017, Bill had the pleasure of attending Honor Flight Maine in Washington, DC with his program guardian, Peter Bohman.

Bill was predeceased by his parents; his wife Norma; daughter Faye; his brothers Ambrose, John, and Ola. Survivors include his two sons, Kenneth and wife, Donna of Edgecomb, and Everett and his wife, Terri, of Readfield; grandchildren include Michael Maxim, Brian and Matthew Saunders, and Paige, Sarah, Katie, Emily, Desiray, Nicholas, Bryton, Abbigail, and Allie Jo Maxim; also several nieces, nephews and cousins.

Visiting was held on Thursday, Jan. 18 from 2 - 4 p.m. at Roberts Funeral Home, 62 Bowdoin St., Winthrop, where a celebration of Bill's life was held on Friday at 11 a.m. Spring burial with military honors will be in Glenside Cemetery, Winthrop. KENNEBEC LAND TRUST REACHES 6,000 ACRES OF CONSERVED LAND WITH THE DONATION OF THE EGYPT POND CONSERVATION EASEMENT IN VIENNA AND CHESTERVILLE

Winthrop — On December 19, 2017 Kennebec Land Trust member Stewart Myers donated a 238-acre conservation easement in Vienna and Chesterville in Kennebec and Franklin Counties to the Kennebec Land Trust. This generous conservation donation, which encompasses most of the shoreline of remote Egypt Pond, will forever protect outstanding natural scenery, water quality, working woodlands and farmland, and important wildlife habitat.

Located off of the Egypt Pond, Soper and Allen Roads, the Trust's newest conservation easement includes more than 1.5 miles of undeveloped shoreline, mixed woodlands, hayfields, and wetlands with vernal pools. The existing State of Maine public boat launch provides public access to the waters of Egypt Pond, a popular fishing destination.

Stewart Myers and his late wife Maureen first came to Egypt Pond in the 1970s, when they purchased land on the north shore. "We looked out from our campsite at a prospect of undisturbed beauty and solitude. Maureen would be as happy and grateful as I am to know that the pond will remain in all essentials just as it was then."

Howard Lake, KLT's volunteer attorney and long-time member of the KLT's Lands Committee, commented that: "It has been such a pleasure to work with Stew and his late wife, Maureen, to conserve this beautiful piece of Maine. The conservation of expansive undeveloped shoreline and having available boat access makes Egypt Pond a true gem."

To date KLT has conserved 66 properties, including 32 by conservation easements. Conservation easements are properties where KLT holds the development rights, but the land is under separate ownership.

Since 1988, KLT has worked cooperatively with landowners and communities to conserve the forests, shorelands, fields, and wildlife that define central Maine. The Trust's conserved lands encompass over 6,000 acres in the Kennebec River and Lakes region. For more information call 377-2848 or visit www.tklt.org
