

Satisfaction and Gratitude

"I have stilled and quieted my soul: Like a weaned child with its mother, like a weaned child is my soul within me."

May is a special month of celebration because of Mother's Day. Here in Maine May is also the month when the weather starts getting warmer, and we can say the winter is gone (We really hope that we're right about the end of the winter!)

Thinking about that, we chose this Psalm to share with you because it is surely a biblical text that was written from a female perspective.

The idea of this passage is describing a child who just after being fed from the breasts of its mother gets quiet and still with its head lying on its mother. We hope you can picture this image in your imagination. We cannot imagine a place where we could feel safer. Held by those sweet arms, listening to the heartbeat and feeling the warm and soft mother's body, having our need for nourishment and safety satisfied. This Psalm shows us two perspectives: the importance of those who have cared for us like a mother and the satisfaction that it's possible to feel when we have what we essentially need.

During this time when we are going to celebrate Mother's Day, we are invited through this bible verse to recognize the important and immeasurable love and care that we have received and many of us still receive from our mother. Take time and make an effort to show and honor them with great love too.

Also, we are invited to think about our view of life and the way to live. After spending time thinking about a mother's care, the author of the Psalm understands that we, even as grown-up people, need to rest and recognize the fulfillment of what we have, and not spend all of our time seeking more and more, without having satisfaction. Sure, we grow, and we must mature. It is important and necessary. However, we need to remember what is important in life. Because life was made to be lived.

We are not that different from a child in its mother's arms. We are working and fighting in life to have some kind of realization and accomplishment, and to have it we spend time and energy, and in many moments we lose what is important, which is to enjoy what we already have with people we love and care for.

This Psalm ends by giving us an important reference: "Put your Hope in the Lord both now and forevermore." – That can be a way to rest our soul and enjoy our life, even with its challenges.

While we enjoy May's beauty and warmth, let's be grateful for what we have, for those who take care of us in life, and discern what is worth seeking in life.

This month the Selectboard will be meeting on Tuesday, May 7, and May 21, at 6:30 PM at the Ladd Recreation Center and by Remote. This month the Planning Board will be meeting on Thursday, May 9, at 6:30 PM at the Ladd Recreation Center. This month the Conservation Commission will be meeting on Wednesday, May 1, at 5:30 PM at the Cary Memorial Library.

Reminder, RSU #38, Annual Budget Meeting will be held on Wednesday, May 8, at 7:00 PM at the Maranacook Community Middle School. Members of the RSU #38 School Board will explain the warrant articles within the budget and the citizens of the four towns will vote on those warrant articles. A brief description of each warrant article will be outlined in the RSU #38 Annual Report.

The Town's Assessor Agent Matt Caldwell from RJD Appraisal will be available by appointment on Wednesday, May 22, to answer any questions you might have about your assessment or tax bill. Please contact, the Town Office to schedule an appointment.

The Annual Memorial Day Parade will be held on Monday, May 27th. Parade participants meet at the Wayne Community Church Parking Lot (Old Winthrop Road) at 10:30 AM - 10:45 AM, and the parade begins at 11:00 AM, proceeds on-route with a stop at the Memorial Stone in Memorial Park (Main Street), then arriving at Roderick Park (Memorial Park Lane) for the ceremony at approximately 11:30 AM.

The Selectboard will be holding a Public Hearing at their regularly scheduled meeting on Tuesday, June 4, at 6:30 PM for the 2024 Final Annual Town Warrant Article & Budget. The purpose of this hearing is to learn more about the referendum ballot questions that you will be voting on Tuesday, June 11 & Wednesday, June 12th.

State Primary Election and Annual Town Meeting – Election of Officers, Tuesday, June 11, 8:00 AM to 8:00 PM at the Ladd Recreation Center; Annual Town Meeting – Budget Meeting, Wednesday, June 12, 6:30 PM at the Ladd Recreation Center. Absentee ballots will be available at the Town Office. If you have not registered to vote, please stop by the Town Office to register.

During the month of May, the Town of Wayne will be using the services of E.C. Barry & Son to conduct street sweeping. They will be sweeping select town streets and town lots. Please do all your spring clean-up prior to our street sweeping.

The Town of Wayne has an Animal Control Ordinance that states no domesticated animal, licensed or unlicensed, shall not be permitted on Town property (highways, sidewalks, Ladd Recreation Center, parks, footbridge, Wayne Town House, North Wayne School House, Town Boat Launch, Fire Stations, or old Town Office) without a leash. The Town provides dog waste bags in the parks around the mill pond, please be courteous of others who use these public facilities and pick up after your dog.

As we approach the end of the school year, I wanted to share an important update regarding our school's status and the recently approved budget for the upcoming academic year.

First and foremost, I want to express my sincere gratitude for the continued support and engagement throughout the budget discussions. The collaboration between district leaders and our community has been invaluable, and the approved budget reflects our shared commitment to providing the best possible educational experience for our students.

One topic that garnered significant attention during the budget process was Wayne Elementary's Tier Three status. As many of you may know, our school has been identified as needing additional support and resources to help our students achieve academic success. This Tier Three designation is part of Maine's statewide system for supporting schools and students, with schools classified into three tiers based on factors such as student academic performance, attendance, and other key indicators.

Being classified as a Tier Three school means we will receive targeted resources and guidance from the Maine Department of Education to help us improve in areas such as literacy, math, and attendance. This designation also comes with increased monitoring and collaboration with the state to ensure we are making steady progress. It's important to note that due to our small population size, every single student's performance and attendance have a significant impact on our school's status.

Speaking of attendance, I cannot overemphasize its crucial importance. Regular school attendance is a key factor in a student's academic success and overall well-being. When students miss school, whether due to illness, appointments, family vacations, or other reasons, they miss out on valuable learning opportunities and can quickly fall behind their peers.

As we work to improve our Tier Three status, consistent student attendance will be a critical component. We need all of our families to partner with us by ensuring their children are in school every day, arriving on time, and ready to learn. Attending school regularly helps students develop important skills, build relationships, and stay engaged in their education.

I want to thank the entire community for your support and commitment to our school. We look forward to a continued partnership with all Wayne residents in our journey of growth and improvement. Moving forward, the district-wide vote is scheduled for 7 p.m. on Wednesday, May 8th at Maranacook Middle School and the referendum vote is scheduled for June 11th in conjunction with the state primary election. Please come out to make your voices heard.

Feeding wild birds is one of the most popular activities in the United States, it provides countless hours of enjoyment to millions of people and contributes millions of dollars to the economy. It gives people the opportunity to observe and identify different species, understand many aspects of their life history and, creates a strong connection to the natural world. In response to this demand, numerous books and field guides on wild birds have been published for the bird-watching public.

Numerous species are attracted to bird feeders, some are year around residents, some seasonal, and others visit feeders for short periods during their annual migration. Each has its own characteristics, such as size, shape, coloration, songs, distribution, and habitat preferences. Bird feeders provide a great place to observe and identify birds close-up, however, they are not a natural setting. Observing wild birds in their natural habitats, "Birding", has become a major pastime, and requires binoculars and some additional skills. In addition to size, shape, and coloration, a knowledge of their preferred habitat, behavior, and songs become vital to identifying birds at a distance.

Many find these skills more challenging to master, especially identifying a species by its song. However, with the advent of smart phones and apps specifically designed to identify wild birds these skills are put at your fingertips. The apps are readily available, at little or no cost, and can be found in the "App Store" on most smart phones. They provide a means of readily identifying birds by entering their size, shape, coloration, behavior, and location, as well as by their songs. Just enter the requested information and pictures of likely species will be displayed. The songs are amazingly recorded by simply pointing the phone in the direction of the song, and the species is identified. If you enjoy observing birds, why not give it a try and you will be hooked on this amazing technology.

Birding is a great adjunct to taking a hike or even a short walk, and modern technology is making it more interesting, while expanding your enjoyment of the out of doors. Wayne's 100 Acre-Woods is a great place to take a hike and see how this all works.

SAVE ANDROSCOGGIN CAMPAIGN: PROGRESS UPDATE

Save Androscoggin – Campaign for a Healthy Lake is an ambitious effort to fund a three-year program to fight invasive milfoil and algae blooms threatening the future of our lake. Working in partnership, the 30 Mile River Watershed Association and Androscoggin Lake Association (ALIC) established a goal to raise \$150,000 for Save Androscoggin.

The results are in. So far, we have raised \$162,276 in gifts and pledges. *Save Androscoggin* has shown that many people are committed to preserving and protecting Androscoggin Lake's water quality and natural beauty, and to donate significant time and money to this cause.

Save Androscoggin has shown that progress can be achieved in making our lake healthier. With your continued financial and volunteer support, we can keep that commitment strong for years to come.

Of course, there is more work to do. But, we accomplished a lot in 2023. To fight invasive milfoil spread, the 30 Mile team spent more than 480 hours surveying the Inner Cove to detect and map all milfoil plants, and a trained diver removed each milfoil plant found.

We also made progress in 2023 in fighting to protect water quality. With *Save Androscoggin* funding, 30 Mile conducted expanded water quality testing. This testing helped identify and quantify sources of phosphorus in Androscoggin Lake, the Dead River, and several tributaries draining to the lake from the surrounding watershed. Also, thanks to watershed survey and planning efforts funded by *Save Androscoggin*, 30 Mile successfully obtained \$150,000 in EPA funding to repair roads, culverts, and other projects to reduce phosphorus runoff into the lake as part of the *Androscoggin Lake Watershed Protection Project, Phase I*. With the watershed grant project now underway, we need landowners to participate in grant-funded events and activities.

Subsidies now available for residential improvements on Androscoggin Lake! FREE site evaluations and cost-share grants up to \$1,500 are available to help protect water quality. We are hoping to assist 10 property owners make improvements by the end of 2025. All property owners on Androscoggin Lake are welcome to apply, but priority will be given to residential properties with erosion or runoff issues or with erosion sites identified during the 2022 watershed survey. Examples of lake-friendly improvements include defining and stabilizing shorefront pathways, infiltration steps, native shoreline buffer plantings, waterbars and diverters, roof runoff BMPs, living shoreline stabilization projects, and more. Grant funding of up to \$1,500 must be matched by the landowner (50% cost-share) through out-of-pocket expenditures and/or their own or volunteer sweat equity as in-kind contributions!


