A note from the Finance Committee:

The United Methodist New England Conference budget allows the Methodist Church to fulfill our vision and mission throughout the US and the world. Local churches' participation in each annual budget is expressed as Mission Shares or Apportionments.

These are divided into 3 funds – World Missions, New England Missions and Ministry Support.

This year the Wayne Community Church budgeted for, and paid in full, the Ministry Support of \$12,385.

But still outstanding was:

\$4489 for New England Missions – which pays for things like campus and youth ministries, congregational development, leadership development, commissions on Diversity and many other things within the New England conference.

\$4959 for **World Missions** which pays for things like Ministries and Mission work in the US and throughout the world, Black college

funding, African University funding, and Episcopal funding (supports Bishops offices and retired Bishops)

At our year-end Finance Committee meeting in December, the committee felt that the best we could cover of the New England and World Missions was \$1000 to each of these funds.

So, Pastor Ruth suggested Make a Change Sunday. On Sunday, January 6 we asked for donations so that we could increase our giving to our United Methodist Mission Shares for 2018. We are thrilled to report that we raised another \$1500 on January 6. In addition to that we have had an individual pledge of \$1000, and between contributions and pledges being fulfilled during the last week of December, we were able to contribute another \$1500.

Now we are pleased to report that in addition to paying our Ministry Support in full, we have also paid \$3000 to each of the New England Missions and World Missions representing over 60% of our apportionments.

Thanks so much to all who supported this effort. Blessings to you all.

The Alice in Wonderland Room is being preserved!

Thank you, Grace Burleigh! Many of us have fond memories of the "tea parties" Grace hosted in the unique "Alice Room" at her home (it was also a centerpiece stop on a recent Home Tour). This iconic cultural art installation has a special place in our hearts and in local Wayne history. Grace has asked that it be preserved for future generations of Wayne families and has donated the entire room to the library for the enjoyment of the Town. The Library has accepted the painted wall panels recently painstakingly removed by Maine based internationally acclaimed art conservators. The next steps are to properly treat and protect the artwork and

then to replicate the room and reinstall the art. Watch for more news about this special project as the "new home" plans are completed. SUSTAIN WAYNE

We are in the process of planning our 2019 programming and look forward to some fun community events this year, including a potluck supper, environmental sustainability programming, and another ever-popular outdoor dinner.

We continue to fundraise for Phase I of the Masonic Hall Renovation, which will save the building by lifting it out of the flood plain, replacing the sill and footings, and resting it back down on a new concrete foundation. Phase I will also complete necessary roof, window, façade repair, and provide for on-site reuse of the existing granite foundation.

Wayne was awarded a \$50,000 Community Development Block Façade Improvement Grant by the Maine Office of Community Development. While a majority of the funding will go toward exterior repairs and improvements (since it's a façade improvement grant); \$20,000 can be allocated towards replacing the sill and footings of the building. Along with the \$16,000 we have received from 70 area donors we are almost half way to our fundraising goal.

We still need to raise \$75,000 towards the foundation and site work, but we are still hopeful to begin much-needed renovations to save the Hall this spring.




