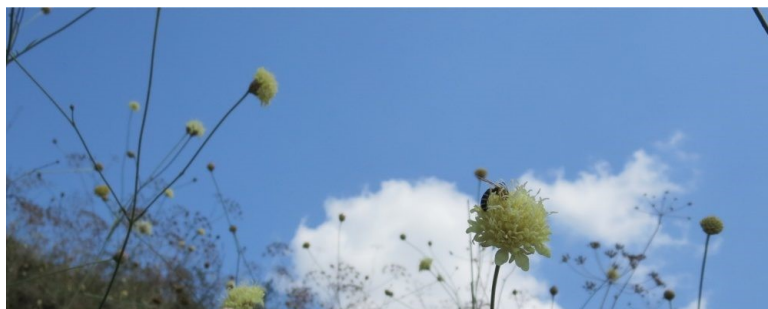

Please remember that kids are heading back to school, so please watch out for the kids at the bus stops and walking along the roads. The Town has contracted with Kennebec County Sheriff's Office for rural patrol this fall. Police will take notice.

In observation of **Labor Day, Monday September 2, 2019**, the Town Office will be closed. It will re-open on Tuesday September 3, 2019, during our regularly scheduled hours.

The Town's **Assessor Agent** Rob Duplisea from RJD Appraisal will be available by appointment on **Monday September 23, 2019** to answer any questions you might have about your assessment or tax bill. Please contact, the Town Office to schedule an appointment.

Your **2019 property taxes** were committed in August and tax bills were mailed at the end of August. **Property taxes are due on Tuesday October 1st, 2019.** We were able to lower the mill rate that was presented at Town Meeting, 14.99 Mil Rate to actual 14.96 Mil Rate due to unexpected increases in State Revenue Sharing and better than projected Total Taxable Valuation.

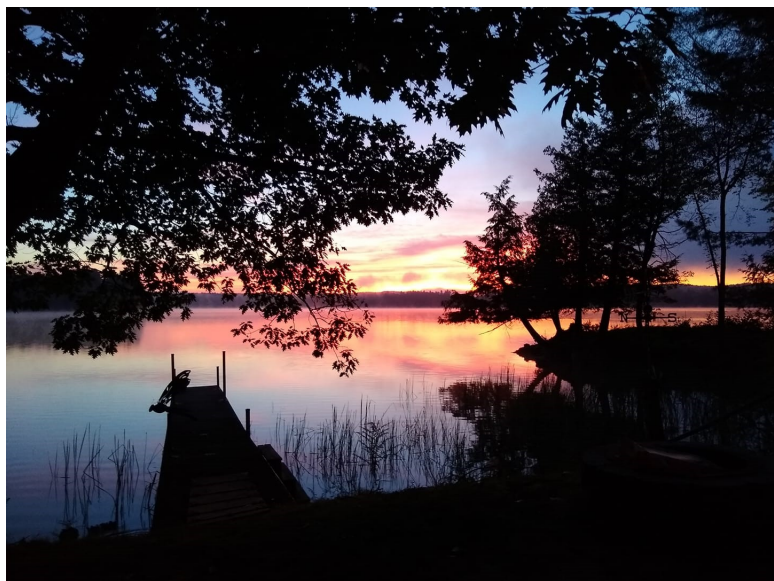
ALICE IN WONDERLAND ROOM/Williams House CARRIAGE BARN RENOVATION UPDATE

**WAYNE PROJECT SUCCESS! YOUTH
CONSERVATION CORPS COMPLETES LARGEST
PROJECT TO DATE**

For many years, the steps at the dam in North Wayne had provided users access to Lovejoy Pond, but in recent years, the area had been deteriorating, with severe erosion, rotten wood, and invasive Japanese knotweed taking over. The eroding steps and banks were allowing soil and phosphorus to enter the water, harming water quality, and the rotten wood was becoming hazardous. This well-used and loved area needed some serious help.

We worked with the Town of Wayne and the Kennebec County Soil and Water Conservation District to make a plan, and our Youth Conservation Corps (YCC) took on the project with lots of energy! This project was the biggest tackled by YCC to date. Will Jeffries, 30MRWA’s Water Resources Manager, led the ambitious project along with Chloe Kenyon, YCC Crew Leader. With tools in hand and materials ready, the crew set out to transform the steps.

First on the list was to install new infiltration steps that would prevent water and soil from entering the pond. Rip rap was added to slow and filter water running down the hill. To stabilize the bank, the crew installed geotextile fabric and erosion control mulch and planted 36 native blueberry shrubs. All of these practices help rainwater filter into the ground instead of running across the slope, carrying pollutants to the lake. Revegetating the area with blueberry shrubs will even offer the opportunity for a little future foraging.

The project was not without its challenges. The steep banks made it difficult to use wheelbarrows for moving materials, and large rocks made it a challenge to insert the rebar that holds the steps in place. Fortunately, the rain held off, but the heat did not. This energetic YCC group didn’t let the 90+ degree days and high humidity slow them down.

While the crew worked, many passersby commented on the incredible improvement and complimented them on their skill and fast pace. Collaboration with local town contractors helped speed up the process by prepping the area for the crew. The project was successful in not only its ability to help with erosion, water quality, and safety, but also the beautiful transformation of the entire project area. This newly revitalized town gem is sure to be enjoyed for many years to come.

The Youth Conservation Corps program of the 30 Mile River Watershed Association is working to safeguard water quality by installing low-cost erosion control projects for landowners throughout our watershed. Examples include open-top culverts, vegetated buffers, drip line trenches, infiltration steps, rain gardens and more. All work is cooperative with landowners and provided on a cost-share basis. Fall is the perfect time to have a free site visit to get on next summer’s YCC project schedule.

PROGRESS REPORT ON ANDROSCOGGIN LAKE STUDY

At the August 10th annual meeting of Androscoggin Lake Improvement Corporation (ALIC), Dr. Lloyd Irland was the featured speaker. Lloyd is a Wayne Select Board member and has professional expertise in environment-related subjects. He gave an informative update on the Town's study of the 2019 high water event on Androscoggin Lake and strategies for managing similar conditions in the future. The Town commissioned this study after high water damaged several lakeshore properties and created extreme debris conditions this spring.

Because Androscoggin Lake is part of a much larger watershed, there is the potential for significant volumes of water to flow into the lake or to back up from the Androscoggin River. A review of data going back decades leads to the conclusion that we can expect similar high-water conditions more frequently in the future; at least as often as every 10 years.

Lloyd presented several initial recommendations to proactively manage conditions related to variation in the lake level. These include improved communications and planning at the town level (Wayne and Leeds) and state level, evaluation of ways to improve the operation of the Dead River Dam, proactive education of lake residents to prevent damaging effects on property and water quality caused by flood events, and coordinated and improved warning communications similar to those ALIC undertook this spring.

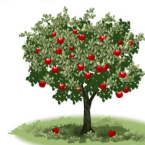

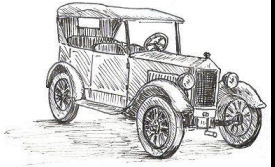
